

# **Advent: Timely Anticipation**

As the days shorten and the nights grow colder, Christians embrace God's promise of light in the form of Jesus Christ, God with us. Heralding the beginning of the church calendar year, Advent begins on December 3<sup>rd</sup> and goes until December 24<sup>th</sup> this year. It's not every year that the fourth Sunday of Advent is also Christmas Eve!

Deriving from the Latin word *adventus*, the word means "coming," "approach," or "arrival." "Advent" is also a translation of the Greek  $\pi\alpha\rho\nu\nu\sigma(\alpha)$  (parousia), a word historically used in the church to signify Christ's second coming. The church collectively waits with hope-filled anticipation for the arrival, "Advent," of Christ in our world, the one born in the flesh and whose presence is with us both now and eternally.

I have always found it interesting that the new church year begins roughly a month before the new calendar year. Much rides on turning the page from December 31 to January 1 — new resolutions, new starts, new beginnings. I suspect there is less consideration given to the move from Pentecost to Advent. But perhaps this is the year to make a change. If we take these liturgical seasons seriously, the seasons of the church that mark our time as believers, should — on many levels — shape how we view time, how we choose to live our time, and how we make sense of time.

Of course, there's all kinds of advice on how to adequately observe the reason for the season. But such sage-isms miss the point entirely — Advent asks us not to treat *this time* differently but to live *in time* differently altogether.

Time is strange, isn't it? It goes by extraordinarily fast when you want it to take its time or painfully slow when you need it, so very desperately, to move forward as fast as possible. Then there are moments that seem to suspend time, as if the world, itself, is circling your own orbit.

We can recall plenty of quotes about time, in which we want to believe but are rarely born out in reality: "time heals all wounds;" "all in good time;" "time will tell;" "stand the test of time;" "time is of the essence." All such idioms appear to be attempts to make our mark on time or to regulate time to our benefit.

Speaking of "standing the test of time," we have some time-honored traditions right here, such as the **Christmas Joy Offering** of the wider Presbyterian church and our own **Christmas Offering** for MWCPC. You will find these two special envelopes with this newsletter.

Since the 1930s, fifty percent of donations to the Christmas Joy Offering have been distributed to the Board of Pensions for assistance programs that provide critical financial support to retired and active church workers and their families. The other fifty percent supports education at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color and leadership development opportunities for people of color through the Racial Equity and Women's Intercultural Ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

The other envelope is for the Christmas Offering for MWCPC. This offering acts much like a Christmas bonus for our community of faith. It serves to help us cover our costs and extends our efforts further in the local community, country, and world.

As you plan your seasonal giving, I think the approaching first Sunday of Advent can serve as a reminder that our time is not our own. We like to pretend that it is; that we can manage it efficiently, plan accordingly... that by our sheer determination we can will it to bend to our needs and desires. We strive to turn it back for many reasons. To re-experience time with someone we love. To relive time with someone we've lost. To recreate a moment in time we want to remember again or that we wish we had handled differently. We wonder if we can alter time in some way, changing its course.

The charge to keep awake during this Advent season is not just about waiting and anticipation. It is not just about getting ready or being ready. Can you ever be ready for Christ's coming? Can we ever be ready for God entering into humanity, into our sinfulness and brokenness, into our pain and loss, into our joy, into our love, into our longing?

The answer is no, and Advent will never be long enough. That's the point. God arrives, regardless of our readiness. God shows up, despite our determination toward manifesting our own destiny. God will come, no matter what kind of stipulations or conditions or provisions we make to persuade God of our timeliness.

Our time is oriented by God's time — always has been and always will be. God entered into our time, forever changing it. God lived time with us, forever altering what time really means.

Ultimately, God entering into time disrupts time, displaces time, disorients time. Not always comfortably. Not always helpfully. Not always desirably. And never how or when expected. Why? Because divinity took on mortality, eternity entered temporality, and love eliminated death. This is the meaning of Advent time.





# Women's Fellowship

Women's Fellowship met on November 2 for the third lesson in this year's Bible Study, "Sacred Encounters." This lesson focused on a woman who had been hemorrhaging for twelve years without relief — a woman for whom life must have been incredibly difficult. Her energy level and ability to cope with life's physical demands would have been greatly diminished, and she had spent everything she had on physicians. As Jesus was on his way to heal the young daughter of Jairus (a ruler of the synagogue), the woman was able to touch just the fringe of his clothes, and she was healed immediately.

In the first century, gods were viewed as responsible for both health and illness of humans. Furthermore, it was culturally unacceptable for a woman to approach a man in public. Desperate, the woman managed to touch just the very fringe of Jesus' outer garment, and Jesus felt power leaving him at the moment she was healed. It was clear to Jesus that a miracle had taken place, and He called to her — claiming her as his own and saying "Daughter, your faith has made you well. Go in peace." The woman in our lesson displayed not only faith but also agency, expressing her individual power through her thoughts and actions. Faith and agency combined to enable her to defy cultural gender boundaries, and Jesus' use of the term "daughter" illustrates his inclusivity and signifies a protected place in the family.

Work continues on our various mission projects. Many requested items - donated by our congregation - were sent (along with a monetary gift) to the Winnebago Mental Institute for the Christmas season. Health congregation members are helping us sew our Little Dresses and Little Britches for Africa. We have assembled kits for these projects with all the needed items, and they are in big baskets near the SERRV table in the Fellowship Hall. If you like to sew and are interested in helping with this mission, please feel free to take one or more of these plastic bags and return the finished dresses and/or britches to us. We will be eternally grateful! We also continue to assemble school bags (70-page spiral notebooks needed) and hygiene kits (hand towels and wide-toothed combs most needed) for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and Church World Service. The items for these kits are usually available at the dollar store, Target, and Walmart. We appreciate you thinking of these projects when you're out shopping!

Our annual Christmas Luncheon is scheduled for Thursday, December 7, 12pm (noon), at The Outdoorsman in Boulder Junction, and we hope all the ladies of our congregation will join us for fun, fellowship, and food to celebrate this joyous season and another productive year! Please let me know if you can attend so I can give the restaurant an accurate count. We also hope you'll consider joining us for our regular meetings on the first (Bible Study) and third (mission work) Thursday of every month. 

### Welcome to Our Newest Member!

She eventually returned to Northwoods, where she worked at Camp Manitowish for almost ten years before retiring.

She currently volunteers with hospice and loves hiking, kayaking, and camping. She's already found a place in the bell choir and will be an active member of our church family!

The Safety Committee continues its efforts to provide a safe and secure facility for all.

First, we've slightly changed the location of one of the new First Aid Kits. The updated location of each follows:

\* Directly above the defibrillator in the Fellowship Hall

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- \* Adele's office/copy room (behind main office)
- \* Downstairs kitchen (cabinet above the counter you face when you walk into the room)
- \* Fleazaar barn (closest to the parking lot)

Session has approved two recommendations from the Safety Committee. The first is the installation of a monitored alarm system for fire, water leaks, and emergencies. A SimpliSafe system will be installed that will provide 24-hour monitoring with direct notification to the 911 emergency call center if smoke is detected or an emergency button is engaged. The system will also monitor for water leaks in the basement, kitchen, and bathrooms with notification to designated church personnel.

Session also approved a recommendation to install new lever handle locks on doors without emergency latches. In addition, dead bolts will be removed from emergency exits. Finally, the locksmith will rekey all church entrance doors, and new keys will be provided to authorized personnel.

With a little luck, both projects will be completed in December, and we will keep you posted on our progress.

The Committee will meet again in early January.



The American poet, Sara Teasdale (1884-1933) manages to express the divinity and the humanity of the newborn Christ child in her poem, "Christmas Carol." I find this poem so compelling in its simplicity, as well as its layered meanings and lessons.

The tiny infant brings people from all backgrounds and all directions together, all seeking... something. He comes for each of us – no matter our circumstances – across time and distance. He still gathers us together today whenever we honor the best aspects of our nature. The weight and importance placed on this baby is enormous if you think about it. Can you imagine carrying the salvation of humankind on your back? And paying the ultimate sacrifice so that we can live renewed lives and find rest in God's presence?

For now, though — a glimpse through the lens of this poem — He's allowed a moment of peace before the weight of the world, of our grasping and fighting and clawing and inhumanity to one another, crushes in on Him, before He realizes His identity and comes into His power. For now, He's just an infant, falling asleep in His mother's arms.

The kings they came from out the south, All dressed in ermine fine; They bore Him gold and chrysoprase, And gifts of precious wine.

The shepherds came from out the north,
Their coats were brown and old;
They brought Him little new-born lambs—
They had not any gold.

The wise men came from out the east, And they were wrapped in white; The star that led them all the way Did glorify the night.

The angels came from heaven high, And they were clad with wings; And lo, they brought a joyful song The host of heaven sings.

The kings they knocked upon the door,
The wise men entered in,
The shepherds followed after them
To hear the song begin.

The angels sang through all the night Until the rising sun,
But little Jesus fell asleep
Before the song was done.

Dig out your spatulas and dust off your aprons! Time to do some holiday baking!! This recipe comes from the archives of Mary Hanson (John's wife). I never got to meet her, unfortunately, but I'm told – by many – that she was such a delight and a very good chef. Thank you, John, for approving this recipe's inclusion here!

## **Cranberry Pecan Bars**

1 c flour2 eggs, beaten2 T sugar2 T milk1/3 c butter1 T orange zest1 c chopped pecans1 t vanilla

1 ¼ c sugar 1 c chopped cranberries

2 T flour ½ c coconut

In a bowl, combine the 1 c flour and 2 T sugar. With a pastry mixer, cut butter into the flour mixture until course crumbs are formed. Stir in ½ c of pecans. Press this mixture into the bottom of an ungreased 13x9" baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 mins.

Meanwhile, combine the 1 ¼ c sugar and 2 T flour. Stir in eggs, milk, orange zest, and vanilla. Fold in cranberries, coconut, and remaining pecans. Spead over partially baked crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 mins or until top is golden brown. Cool in pan on wire rack. Cut into bars while warm.

Mmmm.... Something tells me this would go well with homemade whipped cream! Enjoy!!



We'll try this new protocol for a while and see how it goes.

We've put together some guidelines that should help those who agree to do the announcements. \*Please note: This information is also printed on a sheet of paper at the podium/lectern in the Sanctuary if you ever need to refer to it.

- \* State your name and welcome everyone
- \* Announcements ask the pastor and others if there are special announcements
- \* Loose Coin Offering share which organization is receiving our loose coins that week (this info can be found in the bulletin each week)
- \* Remind people to check their bulletins for additional announcements
- \* Encourage attendees to sign the Friendship Pad
- \* Visitors, if comfortable, may introduce themselves
- \* Greet each other (wave, nod, etc.)
